





Pastor's Corner

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When we watch the year in review segments this year, we are going to hear about all the craziness of 2020. However, I would like to share with you my year in review. This year I had the honor of baptizing 26 men, women and children, giving First Communion to 79 people, confirming 84, witnessing the marriages of 6 couples, and hearing many confessions. I was also blessed to have walked with people who were terminally ill, gave others Last Rites, buried the dead, and grieved with those who mourn. COVID, elections, civil strife, and lockdowns would not keep the sacramental graces of Jesus Christ out of my life.

Our sacramental life points directly to Christmas. On the first Christmas, Jesus Christ took our human nature onto Himself. Being fully divine and fully human, Jesus Christ experienced everything we experience in our life, except sin. Jesus laughed and cried. He loved and mourned. Jesus lived life to the fullest and even experienced death. So, no matter what we experienced in 2020 and will experience in 2021, our God understands what we are going through and supports us on our journey.

This Christmas I pray we rededicate ourselves to our Lord Jesus Christ and allow the graces He wants to give us enter into every day of our lives.

PSYCHOLOGY AND BEYOND: THE UNIQUE VALUE OF PRAYER IN CHAOTIC TIMES

JAN. 12, 2021, 7:00 PM ON ZOOM

Many Catholic prayers are exquisitely designed to optimize stress reduction, ground persons within coherent thought patterns, facilitate emotional catharsis, and increase a sense of personal belonging within a group. However, in addition to these secondary benefits, prayer often provides the only satisfactory solution to our lives during times of crisis. Only a deep interpersonal trust in God, made possible by intimate prayer, enables one to eventually act with genuine freedom in the face of any tragedy.

Dr. Michael Wagner is a practicing Catholic and proud father of four adorable children. Having earned his doctorate in clinical psychology from the Institute for the Psychological Sciences, he works as a licensed clinical psychologist in Maryland and Virginia. Additionally, Michael has recently co-taught a class at the Pontifical John Paul II Institute for Studies on Marriage and Family at the Catholic University of America on psychological issues related to gender, marriage, and family.

THE JESUS PRAYER

One of the most well-known and beloved prayers in Eastern Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches is the Jesus Prayer. There are a few forms which differ slightly but probably the most common goes like this:

***“Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God,
have mercy on me, a sinner.”***

It's a simple, short, and memorable prayer that is repeated many times. It was most likely developed by the earliest Christian monks and nuns, commonly called the Desert Fathers and Mothers, who settled in the deserts of Egypt to live lives of prayer and asceticism. Since its beginnings there have been numerous books and treatises written on the prayer and various methodologies that have developed. The prayer became most well known in the West through the English translation of a Russian spiritual classic titled *The Way of a Pilgrim*, which follows the quest of a 19th century Russian layman who wanders from village to village seeking work as well as the space and time to fulfill St. Paul's injunction to “pray without ceasing” (1 Thessalonians 5:17).

Like the Rosary, one commonly uses a prayer rope, called a *chotki* in the Russian tradition or a *komboskini* in the Greek tradition, for counting the number of repetitions as an aid to prayer. It is traditionally made with black wool and consists of 33, 50, 100, or 300 specially tied knots. The person praying repeats one Jesus prayer per knot. I've personally found the Jesus Prayer to be very helpful when used certain ways in my own spiritual life.

Here's just one way that I sometimes pray it. I have a prayer rope that consists of 100 knots and I will often, like the Rosary, consider this to be one “set” which can be offered in various ways. I will pray different “sets” of the Jesus Prayer throughout the day for various purposes.

1. As an offering for a particular person or a prayer request. This is helpful because of how short it is. It takes about 5-10 minutes to pray a set of 100 depending on your cadence. It is a small way to offer up your prayer for a particular person.
2. As an aid against temptation. This is a great way to distract your mind from temptation and raise it to God.
3. As a short break from studies or work.
4. At Eucharistic Adoration. There are different ways to do it here, but I find it helpful to repeat the prayer throughout, which keeps me focused.

You can look up many different ways that this ancient prayer may be used as a means of lifting one's mind up to God, but I hope that the different ways I have offered may be helpful!

Over the last two months, St. Raymond Parish has disbursed over \$181,000,

- Preventing **45 households** (including 62 adults and 75 children) from being evicted; and,
- Providing, through Catholic Charities, **just-in-time information referrals** to other services and benefits within the San Mateo County system including CalFresh, Legal Aid, and employment.

In responding to the signs of the times, the Homeless Family Fund at St. Raymond Parish is partnering with Catholic Charities San Mateo and St. Francis of Assisi Parish in East Palo Alto to identify individuals and families in need of support to cover basic necessities and to provide information referrals to other services and opportunities in the County.

The applicant, a 36-year married male with two children (1 boy, 4 years old and 1 girl, 3 months old), lost his employment carrying out janitorial work at a hotel in June due to a reduction in staff at the start of COVID-19. At the time, his wife was pregnant and close to term. Unable to sustain their rent, they became homeless in August and were unable to secure housing due to a lack of income/resources. To buy diapers and basic food, the applicant took on odd jobs including cleaning yards, minor construction, and collecting cans and bottles for recycling. At the end of September, given their dire need and the baby's condition (gravely malnourished) the applicant reached out to Fr. Goode who was able to provide him \$600 to check into a motel while they continued to look for work and a place to stay.

In early October, the applicant was able to find a room for rent and Fr. Goode referred him to the Homeless Family Fund. The Homeless Family Fund was able to support the family with first and last month's rent, a security deposit and rent for the months of November and December for a total of \$4,100. Catholic Charities was able to provide information referrals for WIC to improve the food security of the family and to Catholic Charities Immigration Services to help them manage their overall situation.

The applicant, a single mother with 1 child (15 years old) used to work at the Park James Hotel in Menlo Park. When they suspended operations in March due to the shelter-in-place order, she lost her job. In need of income to support herself and daughter, she worked as an in-home caregiver for the county. In June, though, she contracted COVID-19 from the client she was caring for and was forced to stop working. After recovering in August, she found it difficult to find work again while trying to protect her daughter.

After running through all of her savings, she reached out to Catholic Charities and the Homeless Family Fund. St. Raymond Parish, through the Fund, was able to rent for the months of October and November for a total of \$4,700. By the end of November, the applicant was well enough to engage in seasonal work, enough to support her and her daughter to maintain their monthly rent.

SCHOOL CORNER

ST. RAYMOND SCHOOL COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM GOING STRONG

Every year in partnership with the Mothers' Club "Community Service Learning Program" St. Raymond students participate in service projects which have included collecting coats for the homeless, sending care packages to our military overseas, collecting food for local food banks, and providing Christmas gifts for less fortunate children. These service opportunities reinforce what it means to be Catholic; engaging in a meaningful way in the community to see that all are treated with justice and kindness. COVID-19 may have changed the way we do things but not who we are...and our Service Learning Program is an integral part of life at St. Raymond School.



This year St. Raymond School partnered with **St. Anthony's Padua Dining Room** (paduadiningroom.com) to collect food to support people experiencing hardship. St. Anthony's Padua Dining Room is the largest "soup-kitchen" between San Francisco and San Jose and the only organization that provides food daily throughout the year.

This holiday season, St. Raymond School also participated in the **St. Francis Center** (stfrancisrwc.org) toy drive. Sadly, the St. Francis Center found it necessary to request \$25 Target gift cards instead of toys this year. According to the center, "In this really rough time, we can certainly understand how parents may need to forego toys for basic necessities and Target is a store that offers opportunity and choice." With the current social distancing guidelines in place distributing gift cards made sense this year.

St. Raymond School is also busy with its Holiday Adopt a Family program. We are again working with a San Mateo County social worker to help 11 local families that desperately need our assistance. While they need clothes, blankets and other household essentials, we will be providing them with Safeway, Target, Amazon and Visa cards as well as cash this year. In these desperate times, the parents can decide how best to use the gift cards for their family's needs. Every donation will have an enormous impact on the lives of these families.

The St. Raymond community has been extremely generous this holiday season offering tremendous support to those in need here in our local area.
