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A YEAR OF "FIRSTS:" AN INTERVIEW WITH FR. JOHN WINKOWITSCH, O.P.

We met one afternoon outside the St. Raymond parish center to talk about Fr. John's first year as a priest and what had led him to becoming a Dominican Friar. I asked him about the call to his vocation. As difficult as it is to put into words, we agreed, something happens, something unseen is revealed, like a veil being lifted. A landscape appears and you find - you are in it. There's a background. A road runs through it. You wonder where it goes, and you follow it.

Fr. John's Landscape

June 1st, 2022 was the 25th anniversary of his graduation from high school in Cut-Bank, a small farming town in northern Montana close to the Canadian border. Voted the "Quietest" in his class, Fr. John noted the contrast between who he was then and now - a priest and a preacher. He had just written letters to his favorite teachers on this 25th anniversary to thank them for their mentorship and to tell them where he is now.



Baptized Catholic at the age of 21, his love of math and computer science led Fr. John to teaching in Maryland after graduating from Thomas Aquinas College in southern California. It was there, teaching in high school and loving the experience of igniting an interest in math and physics in his young students, that he felt a stirring in his spiritual life calling him to seminary. He entered diocesan seminary for Madison, Wisconsin a few years later. "I basically had two callings: the first to seminary, the second, four years later to the Dominicans." Seeking a Catholic family with the Dominicans, he began five more years of seminary in California. He was drawn to the charism of the Dominicans: preaching. "I come alive when I'm preaching, whether it's at Mass or in public places when people stop me to ask questions, especially non-Catholics."

Highlights of his first year:

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1. My first Mass and BBQ here at St. Raymond after I was ordained. I was doing first blessings for so long that I never even got a hamburger! I'm definitely getting one on my 1st Anniversary!

2. Celebrating Midnight Mass for Christmas. Christmas is one of my favorite times of year, so it was a joy to ring in Christmas Day by celebrating my first Christmas Mass.

3. Making hundreds of House Blessing pouches and prayer handouts to give everybody on Epiphany Sunday. It was a lot of work, but it was SO worth it! Such joy!

4. Providing the sacraments as a priest. So much about being a priest is personal.

I asked Fr. John if he has a reoccurring theme in his prayer life. He answered, "I pray that my will conforms with God's will. As a teacher, I experienced moments of 'disappearing' into my subject matter with great love for my students. Parents would tell me that their children were learning to love math! That 'disappearing' is conforming to God's will. I pray for that. Another repeating prayer is for the purification of the church."

His favorite saints:

St. John the Apostle - The only apostle who stayed at the foot of the cross.

St. Catherine of Siena - She, too, spent her life praying for the purification of the Church.

St. Thomas Aquinas - He was big and quiet and so am I.

St. Padre Pio - I love how he signed all his letters: "Pray, Hope, and don't Worry!"

Fr. John told a story of being called to Kaiser Hospital one recent afternoon to comfort a grieving family. A middle-aged woman had just died. At her bedside were her husband and adult daughter. He said the prayers for the dead and made the sign of the cross on her forehead. Moments later, as he walked through the hospital on his way to his car, a young woman holding her new-born baby spotted him in his white robes and shrieked with joy, "A Dominican priest! Father, would you bless my baby!" He again made the sign of the cross, only this time on the tiny forehead of a newborn. Switching abruptly from death to new life, "it's hard to do," he says. "Learning to be in the moment will be a life-time practice."

We recalled together that he came to St. Raymond as a brother at the start of the pandemic. I asked him what that was like. "Father Jerome hit the ground running on the pandemic. We had daily Mass outside in the courtyard. Zoom Sundays were up very quickly. Parishioners were connected to the faith daily if they

chose, but Sundays on the lawn drew the people, even those who hadn't been regular Mass goers. The donuts and the BBQ's followed. I have been privileged to see this parish bloom. It's growing! I'm a part of it."

And so, we celebrate Fr. John Winkowitsch, O.P. on his first anniversary. He is sharing his landscape as a priest with us. We are a part of it. He will no doubt enlarge it with rich color and dimension for the rest of his priestly life. We are so fortunate to have him.

MEMORIAL DAY REMEMBRANCE MASS THIS YEAR WAS "PERFECT"

Memorial Day remembrance Mass was "perfect" this year: Father Jerome addressed a crowd of about 200 faithful spreading out from under an oak tree-formed cathedral and onto the Holy Cross Cemetery lawn. This gathering- the first in three years and under a beautiful blue sky- was very special, and Father's homily, which wove together themes of remembering both people and American ideals, inspired and even included a unique touch from a rock star.

"As the 'prophet' Bono says," Fr. Jerome opened, "America is not just a country, it's an idea." Letting Bono "speak" by playing a recording of the music legend praising American ideals, Father Jerome completed the Mass, administered Holy Communion and blessings, and then bounded across the grounds to bring Communion or a blessing to anyone on the periphery.

"This is a good turnout considering we didn't do our usual sending of 800 letters," Kathy Wade, Superintendent of the Holy Cross Cemetery, said when asked about the Memorial Day gathering after a



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two-year absence. While in past years 400 or 500 people might have attended in Menlo Park, this gathering arose without any promotion. We had our own St. Raymond multitude, plus, and even enjoyed a wonderful post-Mass reception featuring delicious specialty baked goods, an annual donation by a local bakery owner.

Those honoring deceased loved ones came from both near and far. Locals included daughter and widow of the late Mildred T. Washington, a well-known public nurse and active figure in the community. Travelers included Elizabeth Hurley- joining four of her ten siblings- who came from the East Bay to attend. Hurley showed off her adorable great nephew, seven months old and born- as she shared- on 10/13/21, the same day of the final visit of our Lady to the three children in Fatima in 1917, the day of the miracle of the sun. This precious baby- in fact, all the children attending the Mass- reminded of the importance of Life even as we celebrated the deceased.

"We'll be here again next year," Fr. Jerome said, encouraging anyone who had wanted to attend this year but was unable to do so. Both Fr. Jerome's words and Bono's moving praise of our country reminded that Memorial Day honors those who have died in military service in defense of our country's freedoms and is more than just the- however welcomed- "unofficial official" start to Summer.

WHEN I BEHOLD YOUR HEAVENS, THE WORK OF YOUR FINGERS, THE MOON AND THE STARS WHICH YOU SET IN PLACE — WHAT IS MAN THAT YOU SHOULD BE MINDFUL OF HIM, OR THE SON OF MAN THAT YOU SHOULD CARE FOR HIM?

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity invites us to contemplate the mystery of God as three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. At the heart of God is the relationship among these three persons. As human beings created in the image and likeness of God, we too are created to be in right relationship with God, with each other, and with all of God's creation.

In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis reminds us that we are not separate from the rest of creation, but are joined in communion with it. It is our challenge, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to undergo the profound interior conversion that Pope Francis speaks of, leading to generosity and good stewardship of all God's creation.



We take [ecosystems] into account not only to determine how best to use them, but also because they have an intrinsic value independent of their usefulness. Each organism, as a creature of God, is good and admirable in itself; the same is true of the harmonious ensemble of organisms existing in a defined space and functioning as a system. Although we are often not aware of it, we depend on these larger systems for our own existence. (LS140)


Let us remember that the created world has value, not because of its usefulness to human beings, but by virtue of its being created by God. We should
